Major in History

The History Major

The History Major consists of thirteen courses in World History and U.S. History at the 100 and 300 levels. These include a methods course, Hist 300W: The Historian's Craft, and a capstone experience or internship, Hist 393 or Hist 396.

Accelerated Concentrations

Students pursuing the History major who plan to continue on to our Master of Arts in Teaching program, History M.A. program with Teaching Licensure program, or the History M.A. program may enroll in Accelerated Concentrations for those programs. These concentrations provide pathways for students to move seamlessly into these programs while sharing 12 credits between the B.A. and the M.A.T. program or History M.A. with Teaching Licensure, and into the History M.A. program while sharing 9 credits between the two.

For the major in History, there are no existing admission requirements.

Admission to Accelerated Concentrations:

To apply for the program leading to the M.A.T degree, students must have a cumulative grade point average of 3.00 and have earned at least 60 credits toward their bachelor's degree; at least 12 of those credits must have been earned at NEIU. In addition, students must receive approval from their undergraduate advisor in History, complete the online application for the M.A.T. program, and meet all admission requirements for that program. Accepted students may begin the graduate-level shared coursework once they have earned a minimum of 72 undergraduate credits, at least 12 of which were at NEIU.

To apply for the Accelerated Concentration leading to the M.A. in History with Teaching Licensure or M.A. in History program degree, students must have a cumulative grade point average of 3.00 and a 3.25 grade point average in history courses. They must have earned at least 60 credits toward their bachelor's degree; at least 12 of those credits must have been earned at NEIU. In addition, students must receive approval from their undergraduate advisor in History, complete the online application for the programs, and meet all admission requirements for that program. Accepted students may begin the graduate-level shared coursework once they have earned a minimum of 72 undergraduate credits, at least 12 of which were at NEIU.

Natural Sciences (NS and NSL)** 3 courses, from at least two of the following areas of study; one course must have a laboratory component (NSL): Biology, Chemistry, Earth Science, Environmental Science, Physics (Note: If an FYE ANTH that counts as Natural Science is taken, only one Biology course may be used for Natural Science).	9
Engaged Learning Experiences Students must complete, at Northeastern, three courses designated as Engaged Learning Experiences courses. One of the Engaged Learning Experiences courses must be at the 300-level, and one Engaged Learning	

Experiences course must be designated as "Boundary Crossing".

Discipline Specific (ELE-DS)

These courses have pre-requisites that are specific courses within a program of study. Discipline Specific courses give students a deeper understanding of how knowledge is created and applied in their field.

Boundary Crossing (ELE-X)

These are courses that cross disciplinary boundaries and/or cross boundaries through engagements outside the classroom or University allowing students to see how knowledge gained in one field might inform other fields or other aspects of society.

Math/Quantitative Reasoning (MA)

1 Math course, that has intermediate Algebra as prerequisite OR is a course listed on the General Education Distributive Learning List of Approved Courses. Any 3 hour college level math course, beyond Intermediate Algebra, meets this requirement.

- * Majors in Fine Arts, Humanities or Social/Behavioral Sciences, may waive up to 6 credit hours of General Education requirements in the corresponding distribution area.
- ** Majors in Natural Sciences may waive up to 9 credit hours of General Education requirements in the Natural Sciences distribution area.

Students wishing to be licensed for teaching history in secondary schools should consult the Secondary Education section of this catalog and the Secondary Education advisor in the Goodwin College of Education.

All history majors who do not take HIST 393 are required to establish an Assessment Portfolio with the Departmental secretary before graduation. The purpose of this portfolio is solely to assess the effectiveness of the history curriculum in meeting the goals of the major. The portfolio will consist of either one research paper of at least 10 pages in length, or three theme papers of 3-5 pages in length (book reviews are not acceptable). The paper(s) must have been written for course work in history at Northeastern. Although student papers will not be graded and will only be assessed for statistical purposes, students are nonetheless encouraged to submit their best work for evaluation. STUDENTS ARE THEREFORE ADVISED TO KEEP COPIES OF ALL APPROPRIATE HISTORY PAPERS (or they may deposit copies of their papers with the departmental secretary at the time such papers are handed back by their instructors).

As of Fall 2022, assessment is incorporated into HIST 393 for those who take it. Students are still encouraged to keep copies of their History papers, but do not need to submit a portfolio.

Students in the Accelerated Concentrations must maintain a 3.0 cumulative undergraduate GPA and earn at least a "B" in all graduate-level courses taken for shared credit. The undergraduate degree must be completed within four (4) semesters of the start of the shared graduate-level courses.
